You had to carry an identity card to prove you were a friend and not an enemy!






You were given a gasmask, in case of a gas attack.

You had to put black cloth over your windows so enemy planes couldn't see you.

In an air raid, sirens would go off and everyone had to go into an air raid shelter to keep safe.

Children were sent home from school if enemy planes were flying around the building!





Shetland

The first German bomb from World War 2 landed in Shetland.

Bombs fell from planes, mines exploded in the sea, and ships were attacked.





British soldiers stayed in Shetland to help keep everyone safe.

Some Shetland men went away to fight.



Shetland lasses went away too—they helped to look after wounded soldiers.



At Home



Some men stayed at home to help keep everyone safe.

Norway was under attack so everyone was afraid that Shetland might get attacked too.





The soldiers who came to Shetland, and the Shetland men who stayed at home, helped to look after everyone.

Shetland women sold their knitting—the warm clothes they made were good for soldiers!

Lots of Shetland men went out to fight with Britain in the war.




Some were soldiers in the army.

The boats took people from Norway to Shetland to keep them safe.


Lost at sea

All the British soldiers left Shetland after the war and went home.

There weren't many jobs for Shetland people after the war.
