Session by: Siún Carden, Peter Ratter and Jen Hadfield

Siún moved to Shetland from Belfast in 2016. Her recent poetry pamphlet, *The Boat Game*, was published by Stewed Rhubarb. The publisher describes *The Boat Game* as moving “through a world of ships, ferry routes, offshore rigs, and subsea cables, tracing the hidden systems that connect lives across oceans and islands.”

Siún won a New Writers Award from The Scottish Book Trust in 2024. Her first pamphlet, *Tract*, was published by The Well Review in 2023. Her poetry can also be found in journals such as Irish Pages, The North, Magma, The Interpreter's House, Glasgow Review of Books and The New Shetlander.

She says she finds it impossible not to think about the climate and environment at this point in history, when the effects of human activity are so clear and collective action to address them is so difficult.

Peter grew up in the village of Ollaberry in Northmavine to a large crofting family, and as such was immersed in Shetland’s natural environment from a young age.

He was short-listed for the 2018 Edwin Morgan Award, as well as receiving first prize both in the Scottish Place Names Competition organised by Glasgow University, and the Inspired? Get Writing! Scottish poetry competition, both in 2012. His work has appeared in The Dark Horse and The Scotsman. He continues to write in both English and Shetland dialect.

Poetry Circle

Jen Hadfield's poetry, non-fiction and visual practices sprout from the wildness of our world. Her work tries to honour and celebrate the diversity of our local environment, and, in failing to imitate perfectly a sundew or sandeel, to say something about how precious they are.

She says we ask sometimes what good art or poetry can do in the face of climate change or pollution or extinction. Jen says that when we make art we make these almost unimaginable catastrophes human-sized for a moment, and we help ourselves and each other to process our existential fears and grief, and perhaps to act for the greater good.

In 2008, Jen was the youngest winner of the T.S.Eliot Poetry Prize. *Storm Pegs – A Life Made in Shetland*, her first non-fiction title, was published by Picador in 2024, along with her Selected Poems. She is a recipient of a Windham Campbell Prize for Literature and lives, with her family, in Shetland.

Shetland Youth Voice: A Young Person's Perspective on Climate Change in Shetland

Schools were then tasked to make a creative climate promise tree displaying their climate messages on the leaves and to use recycled or sustainable materials to decorate it.
