## **Marine Planning in Shetland**

Shetland Islands Council

- National and Regional Marine Plans
- Supplementary Guidance
- Aquaculture Planning Applications

## **Regional Marine Planning**



- 11 Scottish Marine Regions
- Covers sea areas extending out to 12 NM
- Delivered by Marine Planning Partnerships made up of marine stakeholders reflecting marine interests specific to their region
- Requirement to produce Regional Marine Plans
- Must conform with the National Marine Plan
- Shetland first to take forward April 2021 Committee
- Powers do not include licensing and consenting



## **Aquaculture in Shetland**

- Hugely important to local economy
- Significant player nationally


#### Finfish (Atlantic salmon)

- Approx. 83 consented farms
- 38,908 tonnes produced in 2017 (21% of Scottish total)

#### Shellfish (Common mussel)

- 147 consented farms
- 5,324 tonnes produced in 2019
  (79% of Scottish total)





## **Marine Development Applications**

- Average 30-40 applications per year
- Majority are aquaculture planning applications
- Remainder are works licence applications
- Nearly all applications are subject to pre-application discussions
- Results in very high approval rate (100% in recent years)
- Majority of decisions taken at officer level
- Planning Committee decisions rare









#### Aquaculture (finfish & shellfish)


- Statutory SG under the Shetland LDP
- Aquaculture-specific policies including general policies, prohibitive zonal policies and policies requiring separation distance between farms

#### **Works Licence Policy (ZCC Act 1974)**

- Non-statutory stand alone policy document
- Contains general policies relating to determination of works licence applications for marine developments (except aquaculture) between MHWS and 12 NM







## Works Licence Application Process (Zetland County Council Act 1974)

- ZCC Act unique to Shetland
- Gives the Council powers to licence all works (except aquaculture) between MHWS and 12 NM
- Non-aquaculture marine developments in Shetland waters require a works licence from SIC <u>and</u> a marine licence from Marine Scotland


#### Process similar to a planning application except:

- No application fee
- Application must be determined within 3 months of advertisement otherwise deemed refusal
- Third party right of appeal unique to ZCC Act allows objector to appeal decision if objection lodged within 28 days of advertisement









## **Works Licence Application Types**

Shetland Islands Council

- Marine Renewables (wave, tidal and wind)
- Cables/Pipelines HVDC Application 2020
- Sea Outfalls, including Septic Tanks
- Sea Defences including Breakwaters and other constructions
- Moorings, Pontoons and Barges
- Piers and Marinas
- Reclaimed Land
- Seaweed Cultivation
- The Act also empowers the Council to grant dredging licences within the limits of territorial waters around Shetland.

### **Works Licence Process**



- 1. Pre-application discussions
- 2. Works licence submitted
- 3. Checked/validated
- 4. Registered/ plotted/ constraints check
- 5. Uploaded to planning portal
- 6. Advertisement in Shetland Times ("valid application")
- 7. Consultation
- 8. Officer commences processing of the application
- 9. Report including policy assessment and other assessments
- 10. Applicant and objectors can appeal the decision
- 11. Monitoring/ Enforcement

3 months to determine

## **Marine Development Application Consultees**

Statutory Consultees (Aquaculture planning applications)

- Marine Scotland
- Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA)
- NatureScot (if located within or near to a designated site)
- Historic Environment Scotland (HES)
  (if may affect a designation of national importance)

Non-Statutory Consultees (all application types)

- Relevant Community Council (always consulted)
- Northern Lighthouse Board
- Harbour Authority
- Regional Archaeologist
- Crown Estate Scotland
- Inshore Fishing Associations
- Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB)







## **Other Required Marine Consents**

- Seabed Lease from Crown Estate Scotland (right to occupy Crown owned land (seabed))
- Marine Licence from Marine Scotland (concerned with safety of navigation and/ or wellboat discharges from finfish farms)
- Controlled Activities Regulations (CAR) Licence from SEPA (setting of biomass and chemical discharge limits from finfish farms, or point source discharges from sea outfalls)
- Aquaculture Production Business (APB) Authorisation from Marine Scotland Science Fish Health Inspectorate (MSS FHI) (relates to animal health requirements and control of diseases)
