Highlights of some of the positive aspects of Council performance from the third quarter October to December 2018 that have been reported to committees during March 2019

Education and Families Committee:

Achievements also included:

- Statistics in the new Local Government Benchmarking Framework report show Shetland Library has an 83% satisfaction rating from residents compared with the Scottish average of 73%.
- Care Inspectorate Reports, in all cases are all Very Good and Good.
- Education Scotland felt that all involved in the system in Shetland have a clear commitment to improving outcomes for young people.
- The October 2018 Inspection reinforced the direction of travel that Shetland is taking to meet the principles within the Joint Agreement, including the new Headteachers' Charter.
- In line with Shetland Islands Council's Remote Teaching
 Action Plan, previously shared with the Education and
 Families Committee in February 2017, progress is
 being made with the development of remote teaching
 pilots in Shetland, testing equipment, broadband and
 connectivity, and the learning and teaching experiences,
 using the Scottish Government's education intranet,
 Glow, and vscene web conferencing.
- Under the direction of a dedicated operational lead for the online learning and remote teaching programme, and with the support of the Western Isles' e-Sgoil, current remote teaching pilots include the delivery of History to secondary three pupils in Sandwick Junior High School; the teaching of German to pupils in Foula Primary School from Anderson High School and instrumental accordion lessons from a music instructor to pupils in Brae High School, Mid Yell Junior High School and Whalsay School.
- A successful Careers Event at the Anderson High School was held on 28 November, with over fifty employers participating. Feedback from employers and participants is being evaluated.
- The recent inspection of Urafirth Primary School Nursery Care Service (7 December) was also included on the meeting agenda. The service received a grade of 'Very Good' for the quality of care and support, and 'Good' for the quality of environment. The quality of staffing and management and leadership was not assessed.
- The Short Breaks for Children Service was also inspected in December 2018 and achieved a score of 'Very Good' for the quality of care and support, and quality of staffing, as well as a score of 'Good' for quality of environment, and quality of management and leadership.

Harbour Board:

Achievements also included:

 Demolition of the existing Scalloway Fishmarket structure is progressing well and the project is within agreed programme and budget requirements at this time.

Development Committee:

Achievements also included:

- Local Development Plan (LDP) Call for sites and adverts for submission of interest have been published and will run for a period of six months.
- Scalloway Making Places Project is achieving very good community engagement and will help to establish the community priorities and how they can be achieved in future place and service plans.
- Colleges Merger: The Full Business Case was approved in December 2018. Implementation under UHI project management resource is progressing.
- Centre for Rural Creativity: This is now making significant progress and a full update report is being presented to the Shetland College Board during this Committee cycle.
- In terms of the success rate for external funding applied for by community groups, in Q3, staff in Community Planning and Development have assisted with eight external funding applications. During the quarter, decisions were received on 5 applications, with all five bids successful. This is a success rate of 100% for the period.

Integration Joint Board:

- 207 people aged 65 and over were offered personal care – assessments are thorough and the Council's policy of reablement has helped us to achieve good performance over a number of years.
- 700 people received technology enabled care in Q3 this continues to be used wherever possible to support people to live as independently as possible.
- Indicator NIPIO6 "Balance of Care" (Percentage of population living unsupported in the community) was highlighted. Shetland's percentage is 98% and it was noted at the meeting that this figure was the best of Scotland.
