How are islands identified for the purpose of the policy, strategy or service?	There is no distinction made for islands. The Plan will apply regardless of geographic location.

Improving life chances for people of all ages, through learning, personal development and active citizenship; and building stronger, more resilient, supportive, influential and inclusive communities. There is no differential impact on islands.
Is the policy, strategy or service new?	Yes, the Plan is new, and replaces the 2018 – 2021 Plan on a rolling 3-year cycle.

The nature of working with different island communities with different characteristics and challenges, means that data very often differs between islands, requiring a different response to meet localised needs. The Islands With Small Populations Locality Plan is a Locality Plan as defined under Part 2 of the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act, 2015 and should enable communities and partners to find innovative solutions to key local challenges.
