Introduction

Cullivoe Primary School is situated in the centre of the village of Cullivoe, which is in the north end of the island of Yell, Shetland. Cullivoe Primary serves the catchment area from Colvister to Gloup. With the school being located in the heart of the village, it is also at the heart of the community. There is a very strong community spirit in Cullivoe and many activities and functions take place in the school itself as well as the local hall.

You may wish to visit the school if your child has been offered a place or if you are seeking a place for your child. Please contact the school to make arrangements.

Communication

The school recognises parents as the prime educators and values communication which enhances each child's learning experiences. There are a number of ways in which the school communicates with parents.

Email (to multiple addresses if requested) All letters / reminders are emailed to parents

- Staff are available at the end of each school day to speak with parents.
- There is a termly school newsletter informing everyone of our ongoing work.
- There is a parents Facebook page a closed group used to share information with parents.
- We regularly contact the Shetland Times to promote our activities.
- Each pupil has a home/school diary which both staff and parents are encouraged to write in to help promote home/school communication.
- In the event of an emergency school closure, each parent/emergency contact is phoned directly by a staff member.



Absence/Sickness

If your child is ill or if you think it is necessary for your child to be absent from school for any other reason, please contact the school with the details, as soon as possible.

A phonecall should be made on the first morning of the absence giving an explanation. A letter should be sent to school on your child's return detailing the dates of absence and reasons.

Concerns

If you are concerned about any aspect of your child's time at school, you should make an appointment to speak with either the class teacher or Headteacher, depending on the nature of the concern.

Parental Involvement

It is important that parents are involved in the life of the school. The school seeks to promote positive relationships with parents. Improving home/school partnerships is a key part of the ongoing work of the school. There are a number of ways parents can show support:

. Supporting learning at home (discussing your child's Learning outcomes, talking about world events, reading together)

. Supporting fundraising events or school concerts.

. Giving of your time and skills e.g. for a particular topic or event e.g. school garden, music/art event

. Attending progress meetings with your child to be fully informed of progress.

. Spending time planning and working on Learning logs with your child.

. Reading and writing in the home / school diary.



. Parents are welcome into the school at any time and, on completion of their PVG, may support learning in the class.

. Parents are welcome to support visits out of school, both local and those requiring transport.

. Parents should be involved in the Primary Seven 'Learner Statement' at transition to secondary.

. Parents are a key part of our Self evaluation process. The views of parents help inform the annual Improvement Plan and seeking the views of parents allow the school to develop their capacity for Improvement. The Headteacher is responsible for decisions made as part of the self evaluation process which takes into account the views of parents, staff, pupils and the wider community.

. Parental views are sought regularly in a number of ways.

. Informal discussion at the end of a school day.

. Questionnaires / surveys available at progress meetings.

School Ethos

Cullivoe School is a Rights Respecting School and has recently been reaccredited at Gold Level. More information is available about this from the School Office. Staff and pupils have worked together to create a Class Charter which sets out the Rights and Responsibilities they feel are important to highlight during school time. Information has been given to all families about our Rights Respecting work and we keep children's rights at the heart of all we do.

Cullivoe School has high expectations of all its pupils, and works to ensure each child achieves success. Achievements are celebrated regularly and displayed for the whole school community to share.

Cullivoe School works in partnership with the community to provide experiences which enhance learning. We have excellent links with local businesses as well as our local hall Committee.

The school promotes positive behaviour and all staff are conscious of modelling respect and good manners. We use conflict resolution to talk through incidents, allowing children to listen to others and reflect on the impact of their words and actions. Staff take time to talk through any situation to ensure there is an understanding of how a situation occurred and that children are able to respond appropriately should the same situation arise in the future. Time is given for class building throughout the school but particularly in P.1 where the process of managing the building of relationships is so important.

Health and Wellbeing is an area of the curriculum which deals with how children grow and develop into adults who are able to cope in the world in which they live. Children are encouraged to acknowledge the choices they have and be very aware of the importance of diet and exercise for their health. Children are encouraged to discuss how they feel, look and think. Every child is valued and has an important contribution to make to the life of the school.

The school has been awarded six Green Flags which reflect the work done by pupils, staff and parents in becoming more



environmentally friendly and learning to be more sustainable. The school won Sustainable School of the Year award at the School Food awards in 2022.

Curriculum – overview

The Scottish Government introduced Curriculum for Excellence across its schools. The curriculum is designed to provide a coherent, flexible and enriched curriculum throughout a child's life from 3 to 18 years old.

The curriculum aims to ensure that all children and young people in Scotland develop the knowledge, skills and attributes they will need if they are to flourish in life, learning and work.

Curriculum for Excellence defines five levels of learning. The first four levels provide a broad general education, with progression to qualifications described under a fifth level, the senior phase.

Level	Stage
Early	The pre-school years and P1, or later for some.
First	To the end of P4, but earlier or later for some.
Second	To the end of P7, but earlier or later for some.
Third and Fourth	\$1 to \$3, but earlier for some. The fourth level broadly equates to Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework level 4.
	The fourth level experiences and outcomes are intended to provide possibilities for choice and young people's programmes will not include all of the fourth level outcomes.
Senior phase	S4 to S6, and college or other means of study.

Teachers and practitioners will share information to plan a child's "learning journey" from 3-18, helping their progression from nursery to primary, primary to secondary and beyond. This will ensure children continue to work at a pace they can cope with and be provided with challenge they can thrive on.

Curriculum

The school timetable gives subject time to Literacy, Numeracy and Health and wellbeing as these are key areas. 'Topic' time is planned in a cross curricular way taking account of the eight subject areas in the Curriculum for Excellence.

The eight subject areas in the curriculum are:

- . Languages / Literacy
- . Maths / Numeracy
- . Health and Wellbeing (which includes P.E)
- . Sciences
- . Technologies
- . Religious and moral education
- . Social studies

. Expressive Arts

Each pupil receives 50 minutes of music, art and P.E from a specialist teacher each week. Each child also has an opportunity to visit the library in Mid Yell where they are able to exchange books every week.

French is taught from P.1 while Mandarin is introduced from P4/5. The school promotes visitors to the school and takes every opportunity to invite people in with skills or knowledge which help to enhance learning.

The school supports the daily mile initiative where children run a mile with staff from March to October. This is a Scottish Government initiative designed to improve the fitness of children.

To help develop pupils' skills for life, work and learning they have responsibility in a number of areas. P5-7 are on the Pupil Council and make decisions such as deciding the charities we raise money for, planning community events e.g. coffee mornings, lunchtime arrangements. Every pupil is on the Eco committee and work alongside community members to make our school more environmentally friendly. Pupils are responsible for Chairing the meetings and taking the minutes. A pupil is appointed as media officer to send emails and letters.

Under Curriculum for Excellence, everyone involved in education has a responsibility to develop young people's literacy, numeracy and health and well-being skills across all areas of their learning.



Examples from our achievement board show the range of ways pupils are working towards becoming responsible citizens, effective contributors, successful learners and confident individuals. Through the week, pupils are expected to read at home and practice their skills with number eg addition, subtraction, division and multiplication. Home learning is seen as an integral part of the learning in Cullivoe Primary School. It should be useful and relevant to learning and something which teachers, pupils and parents approach with a positive attitude.

Learning Logs focus on each child's learning style and creativity. Learning Log tasks are given home every term. The children have 2-3 weeks to complete the task which normally relates to the topic being covered in school. The children are encouraged to respond and show their learning in a way that appeals to them; models, collage, drawings, PowerPoint's, poems, photos, mind maps, etc. There is a wealth of possibilities and the children this year have loved exploring them.

Our school meals are cooked on the premises by Jem, our School Cook. The children are encouraged to eat a balanced meal and table manners of a high standard are expected. If we have any concerns about a child's diet or table manners parents would be notified.

Special diets can be provided for medical reasons after consultation with parents and catering staff. Please inform us of any food related allergies. Dinner money is paid online through the site Parent pay. Instructions on how to do this are available from the school office. Pupil meals cost £2.20 each. The Scottish Government provides free school meals for children in P1-4.

Our children are continually assessed by the staff on an informal basis and their progress and development are carefully monitored and recorded. The children also participate in a range of more formal assessments which we use to ensure they are reaching the appropriate levels of ability. In order to gather good quality evidence of pupils' progress, staff use a wide range of assessment approaches. The active involvement of pupils in this assessment is



essential to ensure they have a well developed sense of ownership of their learning.

Each term parents receive a copy of the learning outcomes planned for Literacy and Numeracy. Comments in the termly report sent out to parents should relate to progress in these areas. Scottish National Standardised Assessments (SNSA) are completed by children in P.1, P.4 and P.7. Results of these are shared with pupils and parents. Parents have the right to withdraw their child from these assessments.

Each pupil builds a Record of Achievement throughout their time in the school. This holds information on their progress and work in school and out of school learning and wider achievements.

Transitions

Transitions occur at key points in a child's education when they move on to a different stage of learning. Transitions can include moving to the next stage of primary education, moving from primary to secondary school, moving to the senior phase of Curriculum for Excellence and then post-school learning, training or work. Transitions can also include any changes in a pupil's learning journey, for example when a pupil changes school or when learning is interrupted.

At key stages e.g. entry in to P.1 and at the end of P.7 there is a transition programme to allow for the transfer of information and to ensure both pupil and parent are comfortable with the move. More details on our transition programmes are available from the school.

Support for Pupils

Most pupils will be given the support they need to fully access the curriculum in the general course of their education. There will be times when some pupils will need additional support. This could be on a long-term basis with the amount of support varying according to the needs of the pupil as progress is made through school or as a temporary support when a need arises.

The website also provides information on mediation and dispute resolution services, links to the NHS and other agencies or organisations that can provide further support, information and advice about support and advocacy.

Additional support is provided either in the classroom on a cooperative teaching basis, as individuals or small groups of pupils may be withdrawn to a more suitable location. Support for learning is offered to any child who needs additional help to ensure they are achieving their full potential. This support may be needed due to the fact they are finding a concept difficult to understand or because they are excelling in a certain area. This support may only be for a short period of time or on a continual basis. Every child is treated on a very individual level. The parents of any pupil receiving support from the ASN teacher will be invited to meet to discuss and agree strategies for support. Parents of a child with an I.E.P (Individual Education Plan) will be asked to attend review meetings to discuss progress and next steps. Any child requiring a referral or an assessment will need GIRFEC consent to be given.

School Transport

Transport is supplied for children who live out with a three mile radius of the school. Transport is provided by R.G Jamieson & Sons. This company also transport children to and from Mid Yell on a Thursday afternoon for a variety of curricular activities. It is the responsibility of parents to ensure their children understand the importance of behaving in a safe and acceptable manner while boarding, travelling and getting off the bus.

Instrumental Instruction

Pupils can receive instrumental instruction from P.5. At present we have access to fiddle lessons. Pupils wishing to receive instrumental instruction are put on a waiting list until a place becomes available. Parents of children entering their P.5 year will receive a letter from Hayfield to assess interest.

School Closure

In the event of bad weather, parents are responsible for making the decision to send their child to school. If the school closes during the school day due to inclement weather, parents must make arrangements for their child to be collected from school, even if they only live a short walk away.

If the decision is taken to close the school before the start of the school day, parents will be informed by telephone and a message on the Facebook page. If the phone is not answered staff will leave a message on an answering machine and phone the emergency contact listed.

The school will be closed if the decision is taken at authority level or the Headteacher decides conditions locally make it unsafe for pupils to travel to school.

Uniform

Cullivoe School encourages pupils to wear a school uniform which consists of a red sweatshirt and white polo shirt. Children wear black skirt or breeks along with this. Each pupil is provided with a sweatshirt by the Parent Council on starting school.
